The Quilt show committee has met and is hard at work planning our show in October 2011. We are looking forward to having another successful show.

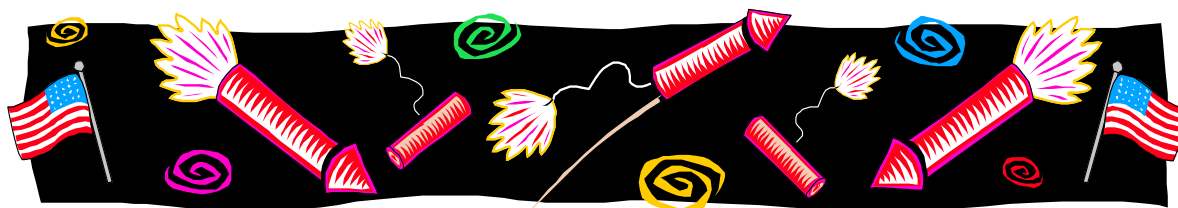
In addition to volunteering at the show as white gloves, ticket sellers, food court helpers and more, there are many ways guild members can help to make this show a success.

OTLB SPEAKER PREVIEW

July: Carol Elrod—Carol was a reporter at the Indianapolis Star for fourteen years, but she has been interested in art since childhood. A few years before she retired from newspaper work, Carol decided to learn how to make quilts, an art form with which she had been intrigued ever since she and her husband received a stack of his grandmother's 1930-s and 1940's bed quilts sometime in the 1970s. Carol pieced one wall hanging of a traditional pattern in 1987, just to get a feel for the process, and quilted it by hand. After that, in about 1990, she made a quilt for a twin bed, also using a traditional pattern and also hand-quilted. It was the last bed quilt she ever made.

She has taken Quilt Surface Design Symposium summer workshops with Glennys Mann, Christine Zoller and Ann Johnston and also has studied with Melody Johnson, Carol Bryer Fallert and Mickey Lawler. Her work has been shown at the East Coast Quilters Alliance shows, the Indiana Governor's mansion, the Indianapolis Art Center, Quilt America!, the Indiana Heritage Quilt Show, Pennsylvania National Quilt Extravaganza, Pacific International Quilt Exhibition, the Who's Rags show of recycled art, World Quilt and Textiles, and the Cape Coral Arts Studio.

She and her husband are now 3/4 time snowbirds. They have a home in Florida and in Indianapolis and are only here now for two or three months out of the year.

Carol will be sharing with us her newest techniques of what she calls "The Human Element" appliqué.

August: The Back Door Quilt Shop will show the newest patterns and latest trends.

National Quilt Museum

The National Quilt Museum has announced a partnership with the National Endowment for the Arts, Blue Star Families, to join more than 700 museums across America in launching the BLUE STAR MUSEUMS program. This program will provide free admission to all active duty military personnel and their families from Memorial Day through Labor Day 2010.

The National Quilt Museum is a non profit institution located at 215 Jefferson Street in downtown Paducah, KY. The museum is open year round, Monday-Saturday, 10 a.m.—5 p.m. CST. The museum is also open on Sundays 1—5 p.m. April—October. The National Quilt Museum is ADA compliant.

Knoxville Quilt Show and Contest

More than 450 quilts will be on exhibit in the AQS Quilt Show & Contest at the Knoxville Convention Center, 701 Henley Street, Knoxville, Tennessee, 37902. Show hours are: Wednesday, July 14 through Friday, July 16, 9:00 a.m.—6:00 p.m.; and Saturday, July 17, 9:00 a.m.—5:00 p.m. Admission is \$11 daily.

The AQS Quilt Contest includes 291 quilts in five categories: Quilter's Choice, On the Wall, Made by Machine, The Ultimate Guild Challenge, and a special category, Galaxy of Stars. More than \$44,000 will be awarded to the winners; the Best of Show winner will receive \$10,000. Special awards of \$5,000 each will be given for hand workmanship, machine workmanship, longarm workmanship, and the best wall quilt; plus cash awards for first, second, and third places in each category.

An additional 200 quilts will be included in special exhibits, including:

- * AQS Authors' Quilt Exhibit, by authors of AQS' latest quilt books
- * The Art of Appliqué, prizewinning quilts by members of The Appliqué Society
- * New Quilts from an Old Favorite: Sunflowers, an annual contest by The National Quilt Museum, Paducah, KY
- * Living Color, a challenge by the Association of Pacific West Quilters
- * The History of Greene County Quilts, 1830—1950, quilts from the National Greene Museum, Greeneville, TN
- * 2010 "New from Old" Quilts, a contest by The Alliance for American Quilts
- * 2011 Pilgrim/Roy Quilt Challenge, quilts by nationally-known quiltmakers that will be auctioned at the 2011

AQCS Quilt Show & Contest in Paducah

- * The DNA Quilt, made by Sandra Black of Tellico Plains, TN

Nearly 100 workshops and lectures offering various quilting techniques are being taught by 20 national quilting instructors. Quilters are able to earn college credit through a joint program between the American Quilter's Society and West Kentucky Community & Technical College, the first program in the country of this type between a quilt show and college.

QGI GENERAL MEETING

MAY 13, 2010

Catherine Carvey welcomed newcomers and guests to our meeting. She also informed the members about the July Block Party meeting which will be a catered dinner and asked members to reserve their spots. There will also be a pitch out for members to sell fabric and other sewing items; you must sign up in advance to reserve a table. Individual members, bees and other groups are invited to assemble friendship baskets to be raffled.

Alice Martina Smith reviewed some results from the membership survey, which had 145 complete surveys. Many individual questions revealed a great deal of variation in opinions from members (love it, hate it). The Board will review the results in detail and use the feedback to plan future events and activities. Alice also noted that spaces for the September retreat are filling quickly. She has 38 reservations with deposits (12 spaces left).

Carol Victory announced that the 2011 Quilt Show now has a theme: "A Quilter's Journey". She is looking for a group or bee who would be interested in planning and constructing a raffle quilt. She is also looking for volunteers who would be interested in doing a lecture or demonstration during the show. There will be no registration fee for quilts for the show (except

for the optional judging fee).

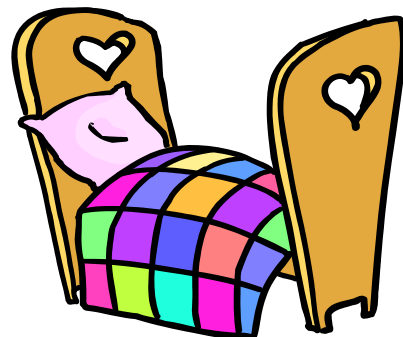

Block of the Month—July, 2010



Thirties Pinwheel in a Square Quilt Block

Designed by Janet Wickell for About.com

Finished Block Size: 12" square

Fabrics: Use 30's reproduction fabric or something similar.

1. White Tone-on-Tone for center pinwheel's background and for the angled strips that divide the inner pinwheel/square from the block corners.
Cut: (2) 6-7/8" x 6-7/8" squares, each cut in half once diagonally.
(2) 3-7/8" x 3-7/8" squares
2. Inner pinwheel: thirties print in either pink, orange, yellow, blue or purple
Cut: (2) 3-7/8" x 3-7/8" squares
3. Square surrounding inner pinwheel: green thirties print
Cut: (2) 5-1/8" x 5-1/8" squares, cut each in half diagonally
4. Block corners: a warm thirties print if your inner pinwheel is made from a cool fabric, or a cool thirties print if your inner pinwheel is warm.
Cut: (4) 3-1/2" x 3-1/2" squares

Do not use kiddie prints, animal prints, reds or browns.

Sew the center pinwheel into a 4-block pattern, white tone with whatever color your have selected.

Add the triangles (half of 3-7/8")you cut in #2 to each of your 4-block pinwheel.

Add the triangles (half of 6-7/8")you cut in #1—white tone-on-tone.

Add the triangles (half of 3-1/2")you cut in #4—warm or cool-to the corners

Trim to 12" square.
