Our October Quilt Show, Quilting at the Crossroads, is fast approaching. Invite your family and friends to attend. Our guild has sew much talent that we can share with Indianapolis!

A huge shout out to Chris Robertson for getting our Opportunity Quilt, *Belfast Market*, set up to sell tickets at the state fair. Chris put in 18 days, about 12 hours/day, to make this happen. Much appreciation for everyone else who put in a volunteer shift (or five!). This was a monumental effort and at last report, Chris & Team sold more than \$1500 in raffle tickets!

By the time you read this newsletter, Quilt Registration may be closed (August 31), so I hope you registered one or more quilts. Check your email in mid- to late September for instructions for labeling your quilt and drop off day on Saturday, October 5. Don't forget to send in your registration fees. Proposed Changes to the By-Laws

The following three proposed changes to the by-laws were announced at the August 8, 2019 general meeting. This vote will occur at the September 12, 2019 regular QGI meeting. Changes require a 2/3 majority vote of the members present to pass.

1) <u>Article VII Section 2.5 - Candidates for Quilt Show Chair and Treasurer</u> Change the cycle of Treasurer to Even/Odd years, from Odd/Even years, same as Quilt Show chair. This change will allow the new Treasurer to gain experience for one year prior to the Quilt Show year.

2) Article V Section 7.5 - Board Members & Voting

Allow email voting by the board in lieu of a board meeting for urgent matters that should not be delayed until the following scheduled board meeting. Board members will be notified of the matter that requires a vote and given 48 hours to question and respond, prior to the actual vote.

3) Article III Section 4 - Name Tags

Eliminate the \$0.25 penalty for not wearing a name tag at the meeting. Section 4 will read as follows: "Members shall make a fabric name tag to wear at all meetings."

2019 Nominating Committee

Shari announced the 2019 Nominating Committee at the August 8th meeting: Maureen Weflen, Mary Ellen Straughn, Judy Barmann

The committee will present the 2020 slate at the September meeting. The vote on the slate will take place at the November 14, 2019 meeting, as there is not an October meeting due to the quilt show.

Mary Ellen Straughn announced the Nominating Committee for 2019 is looking for the positions of VP, Secretary and Quilt Show Chair and described each positions' duties. Anyone interested in the positions are encouraged to talk with anyone on the committee. Nominations will be taken from the floor on Sept 12.

September QGI meeting - Local Author Brian Haggard

Brian's lecture on September 12th will be about embellishment techniques, color coordination, and the use of old things to create new things.

Brian Haggard has never been one to be held to other people's ideas. His creative nature inspires people to try new things with found objects and to always look at them in new ways. He uses this gift in his interior design business, as he creates homes out of houses. Now, he has brought his unique perspective to the artistry of quilting.

At a young age, Brian was given a sewing machine by his parents, from which many projects were born. His pastime was making handcrafted items, with inspiration coming from just about anything in the universe. It has been a natural progression for him to create his textile works.

He has just published a new book 'Blended Embroidery'. His previous publications are 'Crazy-quilted Memories' and 'Embroidered Memories'. His one wish, if you learn anything from the books that he writes, is that you be inspired to find your own creative genius and never forget to enjoy the process.

Brian is the current president of the Indianapolis Button Club. In addition to his love of buttons, he is always open to new ideas and new concepts and has been inspired to build many diverse

collections - parts of which end up in his textile art and quilts. His greatest joy comes from the students he teaches and the smiles that cross their faces when they've freed their inner artist.

QGI 2019 Block of the Month (September)

The blocks from February to December 2019 will be combined to create a quilt top without borders measuring 52.5" x 60". I plan to use multiple fabrics across two main colors (A and B) as well as neutrals (N). I do not plan to use directional prints.

September Block (12.5" x 12.5" finished; 13" x 13" unfinished)

Color A1: cut 4: 3 3/8" squares, cut each once diagonally

Color A2: cut 4: 3 3/8" squares, cut each once diagonally

Color B: cut 4: 3" squares

Neutrals (N): cut 9: 3" squares

cut 4: 3 3/8" squares, cut each once diagonally





Before sewing, lay out all cut pieces to match block layout shown. Sew all seams with a scant 1/4" inch seam allowance.

- Sew the long side of 4 A2 triangles to the long side of 4 A1 triangles to form 4 (A2/A1) 3" squares. Press seam toward fabric A1.
- 2. Sew the long side of 4 A1 triangles to the long side of 4 N triangles to form 4 (A1/N) 3" squares. Press seam toward fabric A1.
- 3. Sew the long side of 4 N triangles to the long side of 4 A2 triangles to form 4 (N/A2) 3" squares. Press seam toward fabric A2.
- 4. Sew four of the 3" N squares to the four 3" B squares to form 4 (N-B) rectangles that measure 3" x 5 1/2". Press seam toward fabric B.
- 5. Sew four of the 3" N squares to the four (A1/N) squares from step 2 to form 4 (N-A1/N) rectangles that measure 3" x 5 1/2". Press seam toward fabric A1.
- Sew the four (N/A2) squares from step 3 to the four (A2/A1) squares from step 1 to form 4 (N/A2-A2/A1) rectangles that measure 3" x 5 1/2". Press seam toward (N/A2) square.
- Sew the four (N-A1/N) rectangles from step 5 to the four (N/A2-A2/A1) rectangles from step 6 to form 4 squares that measure 5 1/2" x 5 1/2". Press seam toward the (N-A1/N) unit. This unit is called SQ7 in remaining steps.
- Sew the B side of 2 (N-B) units from step 4 to opposite sides of the remaining 3" N square. Press seams toward fabric 8. This unit forms the middle row of the block and should measure 3" x 13".
- Lay out 2 SQ7 units and one (N-B) unit from step 4 for top row of block. Repeat for the bottom row. Ensure orientation of units matches final block. Sew a SQ7 unit to each of the long sides of two (N-B) units to make 2 (SQ7-N-B-SQ7) units that each measure 13" x 5 1/2". Press seams toward the middle (N-B) unit.


10. Sew the 2 units from step 9 to the top and bottom of the unit from step 8. Press seams toward the outside of the block. Completed block should measure 13" by 13" unfinished.





Maureen Weflen reported that there were 82 members and four guests present. There is one new member. A total of \$91.91 was collected. Maureen Weflen distributed eight door prizes which were donated by Gloria Stahlhut.

QGIN AUGUST BOM 25 PATCH HALLOWEEN STARS

Background - White or White on White Fabric

Cut (4) - 6 " Squares


Cut (4) - 5 1/2" Squares

Cut (12) - 2 1/2" Squares

Theme - Black or Orange Fabric


Cut (4) - 6 " Squares

Cut (13) - 2 1/2" Squares




20 1/2" Block (20" Finished)

<u>Star Points:</u> Make (8) HST. Draw a diagonal line on 4 white 6'' squares. Right sides together, sew %'' off both sides of diagonal line. Cut on diagonal line. Press to dark fabric. TRIM to 5%''



25 Patch: Arrange squares as shown and piece together using a ¼" seam. Press to dark fabric



Arrange 8 HSTs, 25 patch, and white squares into block pattern and sew. Press to dark fabric (as able).

Triad: 3-color scheme evenly spaced around the color wheel

Choose one hue as lead, and two supporting colors




How to Make a Hanging Sleeve©

The following guidelines will help you create a hanging sleeve that will allow your work to be displayed on a hanging rod. Although this sleeve will meet the requirements for most shows, always check each show's rules. (Note: For miniature quilts hung at the Indianapolis Quilt Show you may reduce sleeve size to 2 1/2".)

- 1. Cut a piece of fabric 9" long, and the width of your quilt.
- 2. With wrong sides together, turn under a $\frac{1}{4}$ " along the short ends of your sleeve. Press. Fold under a second $\frac{1}{4}$ " and press. Stitch along the short ends of your fabric to create a hem.



- 3. With wrong sides together, align the long edges of your sleeve. Sew the ends of your fabric strip together with a $\frac{1}{2}$ " seam allowance. Press seam open.
- 4. Center the seam along the tube. Press.



5. Make a fold $\frac{1}{2}$ " from the bottom of the sleeve, creating a pleat. Press. The sleeve will have extra fabric allowance to insert a pole or rod for hanging.



- 6. Center the sleeve on the quilt back, with the open seam facing the quilt. Pin the sleeve in place, making certain that the sleeve is invisible from the quilt front.
- 7. Hand stitch the sleeve to the quilt, attaching the edges all the way around, leaving the sleeve ends open for insertion of a quilt display rod.

If you want a job that will allow you to sit while you work you might want to sign up as soon as possible.

If you volunteer on Saturday through Thursday prior to the show, you may select the show day (Friday or Saturday) that you want to visit the show. If you volunteer for more than one time slot you will get both days free admission. This includes shifts worked before the show opens.

All volunteers need to check in at the Volunteer Check-in Desk prior to attending the show and prior to your shift. The Volunteer Check-in room is located off of the lobby before admissions on the left.

Early Indianapolis Treasure

Five years ago Indianapolis Historian Libby Cierzniak saw a listing on Ebay for a white wholecloth quilt. She did some research and found that this quilt, rediscovered in a trunk in California, had a card attached saying, "Made in 1830 by Mrs. John Wilkins—an early settler of Indianapolis".



Curious, Libby wanted to learn more about the maker, and found that Eleanor and John Wilkins weren't just early residents, they were "movers and shakers". He was a bank director, library trustee and a strong advocate of higher education of women. A friend of Eleanor's, Calvin Fletcher (as in American Fletcher Bank and Fletcher Place) said of her "she has done more good works than any five persons with whom I am acquainted." Together Eleanor and John Wilkins established Indianapolis' first charity and orphan asylum.

Unfortunately for Libby and the city of Indianapolis, the quilt was sold on Ebay to someone in New York. But if you want to see more pictures of this amazing quilts (well worth the selling price of \$1875) please go to this website. https://historicindianapolis.com/indianapolis-collected-a-stitch-back-in-time/ When you do, make sure you read the comments, so you can learn about another old Indiana quilt with an interesting story.
