QGI EVENING MEETING

Thursday, June 8, 2023

Betsy LaBell, president, welcomed everyone to the June meeting at Orchard Park Presbyterian Church. June birthdays were celebrated and a small gift was given to each person having a June birthday.

Libby Gilbert, program co-chair introduced Lorrie Cranor, who presented her program "Computers, Quilts and Privacy" via Zoom from Pennsylvania.

- Lorrie began quilting nearly 30 years ago to relieve stress while she was working on graduate studies in Computer Science and Engineering. She is a professor of Computer Science and of Engineering and Public Policy at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania where she specializes in Security and Privacy Technologies. Lorrie took a leave of absence for a year from Carnegie Mellon to visualize privacy and security in an art form. She created a fabric picture of herself using small squares of fabric in the style of Salvatore Dali in "Lincoln in Dalivision".
- She once gave a talk on TEDx entitled "What's Wrong With Your Pa\$\$w0rd". In the classroom, she teaches students how to make passwords that are easy but secure. She made a "Password Quilt", where she used color and size of fabric pieces to denote how often a particular password was used. She called the quilt "Security Blanket".
- Another technique that she has explored is "Interleave". The design is formed by cutting thin horizontal strips from two panels of fabric and piercing horizontally, alternating strips of fabric from each panel. Strips can be shifted to the right or left to form complex looking wave patterns. Instructions for Interleave quilts may be found online at lorriecranor.org.

QGI members Stacked and Whacked with Mary Strinka on June 3rd


Many of us gathered in Zionsville to learn from Mary Strinka, and she did not disappoint. She had many examples of her fine workmanship in a wide variety of styles of Stack N Whack (SNW) quilts. She shared both simple and complicated quilt versions and encouraged each attendee to make the best use of the fabric they had.

Before getting into specific techniques, Mary and everyone wandered around the room to see fabrics which had been brought. According to each person's wishes, and taking the amount of fabric they had, Mary provided guidance on what might be done and important things each of us should consider. An added bonus were additional creative consultations by other attendees. Many gorgeous fabrics were scrutinized and many times lusted after. Specifically, Maureen had a large amount of yardage of an amazing African print, which we voted would be perfect for a different project and one that didn't ask to be cut into many small pieces. She had another multicolor floral print that was crying out to be both stacked and whacked.

Some like Barb Triscari weren't sure if the fabric they had (in her case the end of a bolt from the going out of business sale at Quilt Expression), but Mary made it seem that everything was possible, we just had to be brave and carry on. Pam, who had some half-finished SNW projects she'd previously started, decided to ignore them again and cut up a cactus fabric provided by Mary instead. The need for some yellow and some orange fabric enabled her to have reason to visit an amazing quilt shop in Branson, Missouri. Not that Pam ever really needs a reason to buy fabric, of course.

Patty Davis had some lovely multicolored jewel-toned fabric that she chose to cut into very large triangles. She left the workshop with plans on how to finish a quilt time in a snap. Thanks again to Mary Strinka for leading this wonderful workshop.

UPCOMING QGIN Events You Should Plan to Attend by Pam Durant

Yes, I am prejudiced, I think you all should attend all QGI meetings each opportunity, but we have some special ones coming up for QGIN that I hope you have make time to attend at the Barrington In Carmel.

July 7th will be a Gold Crown Event, or at least a fun fascinator event. Maureen Weflen, Maggie Carr, Mary Ellen Straughn and Shari Harrison had an epic adventure in Great Britain, visiting England, Wales, and the Birmingham International Quilt Show among other places lead by Brandy Maslowski, a recent speaker at QGIN. Maureen and Maggie will represent the group and recount their trip to with photos in a jam-packed slide show of all their adventures. Maureen will bring the quilt she bought in England and some coronation fabrics to see. Maggie is bringing homemade scones! It will be interesting, I love to live vicariously through their travels and anxiously look forward to this event.

Aug 4th you'll be treated to a talk I've been working on for a while on Map Quilts. I plan to give an overview of maps in fabric and quilts through history and up to the present. I will show you a number of ways you might choose to make a map quilt, and tease a variety of styles. Then in October I will give a workshop Making Map Quilts. Why the time gap? To give you time to figure out what type of map you want to make, and buy or have made (think of the sources Leigh and Barb talked about). I think no one would show up if this was scheduled for the day after my lecture. I am hoping I'm not talking to an empty room on October 7th in Zionsville. Admittedly, right now many of you would probably say that you never thought of making a map quilt, so you aren't interested. Hopefully, after my talk, you will feel differently. A civil war battlefield map for your brother-in-law? A special map with his favorite places for our autistic grandson? A map of your current or former hometown? The possibilities are endless.

Sept 1st you'll get to learn about six quilt contests sponsored by the *Indianapolis Star* starting in 1976. Some harken back to the early blocks carried in the 20s and 30s, asking for a new twist on these blocks. Play back the memory tapes and see if you or your friends (guild members or not) may have made a quilt for one of the *Star* contests. Please bring them to the meeting if possible. Our leader Pam Durant welcomed everyone and we sang happy birthday for those with June birthdays. Our past president, Lynn Thomas, gave an overview/demonstration of how Electric Quilt (EQ8) software program works to design your own quilt or preview a quilt to see the yardage you need, construction of the blocks and changes in colors in the quilt. You can purchase it for Mac or PC, prices vary but it runs about \$240.00 on the EQ8 website, to \$145 on Target or Amazon. Lynn said sometimes after she has drawn it in EQ she doesn't need to make the real thing. However, it can help tremendously in giving the basic look of a quilt before you make it. The program allows you to even scan in pictures of fabric if you want to use the real thing versus use representative library color blocks. Lynn created a handout with the blocks she was using in her sample quilt to make it easier to follow – it is still available in the Forum where the meeting link was located. A VISIT TO SEE THE LAST SUPPER QUILT MOUNT OLIVE LUTHERAN QUILT MINISTRY 5171 W. Smokey Row Rd., Greenwood, IN 46143 <u>www.moconnect.org</u> By Maureen Weflen

On Saturday, June 24, I drove to the Mount Olive Lutheran Church for a viewing and presentation of the Last Supper Quilt. Over the course of more than 2 years, the church's Quilt Ministry Team gathered on Tuesdays to create this 5' x 15' quilt reproduction of DaVinci's Last Supper using 47,752 1" squares of fabric



In addition to the history of quilting at this church presented by Janine Owen, Office Administrator, and member of the Quilt Ministry Team, Senior Pastor Jeff Alexander shared the church's connection to the Calvary India Mission Tailoring Center. He also explained the symbolism in the last supper painting. The members of the Quilt Ministry Team creates quilts for local and global missions, comfort quilts and pillow cases. Samples of their beautiful work were displayed on the rows of seats in the sanctuary. Other quilts were displayed in other areas of the church.







Following the presentation we were able to tour a step by step display of how the quilt was created (more on that on the next page), see more examples of quilts and quilted items created by the team, a tour of their sewing room and stash of donated fabrics, and we were treated to homemade baked goods and lemonade. **I highly recommend making a trip to see the quilt.** The sanctuary is open Mondays through Thursdays from 10am to 3pm. The Office Administrator's phone number is 317-422-9991 should you need further information. The Quilt Ministry Team meets every Tuesday if you want to see them in action!

FACTS/SUPPLIES USED IN THE CREATION OF THE LAST SUPPER QUILT

Two ladies with a vision for making the quilt

1 full coverage cross stitch pattern

Project began late 2020

- Project completed January 2023
- 52 DMC embroidery thread colors matched to donated fabric inventory
- 1" squares of cut fabric, finished at 1/2"
- 47,752 squares of fabric used
- 3 rolls of 20 foot 1" grided fusible interfacing used
- 376 rows wide by 127 rows high (188" x 63.5")
- Six panels used and sewn together to create the whole piece
- Size 60W thread used for sewing rows
- Brother Model SQ9285 sewing machine used
- Black fabric markers used to add definition to some features
- One member dedicated to bobbin winding
- Three members worked on sewing the rows
- ALL members offered support and encouragement along the way

After discovering an extraordinary quilt from Connecticut in an online quilt history forum and securing permission from its owner, a quilt group from Northwest Washington began the journey of patterning The 1876 Centennial Quilt. Set in a unique Medallion-style arrangement, this quilt contains over 70 individual block patterns. Each quilt maker skillfully and beautifully interpreted the original quilt and the quilts represent a wide variety of styles. The exhibit is a mix of quilts from the original project begun in 2015, and, as the reach of the 1876 Centennial Quilt Project has grown, more recent additions. As the quilt makers honed their skills, they learned much about themselves and forged lasting friendships.

Feel free to cut and go where your imagination takes you! Entries can use any technique or variety of techniques. Go ahead and piece or appliqué or embellish or fussy cut or embroider....whatever it takes to make your vision! Traditional? Go for it! Modern? Go for it! Art is your vibe? Go for it!

All of the above? Go for it!

The rules are: Your quilt must be **at least 75%** hand-dyed and/or batik. It must measure **30 inches by 30 inches**. And, it must follow the show guidelines for <u>quilt entry</u>. Additional show information is at **ihqs.org**.

So be brave! Cut and create with those **batik and hand-dyed fabrics** and meet this challenge! We can't wait to see the results!
